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LETTER FROM OUR TEAM RECTOR

Dear friends

This year clergy across the country are probably feeling a bit of pressure due to the early date for Easter Day (31st March), meaning that there seems little breathing space between Christmas, Lent and Holy Week. But perhaps this close proximity can be seen as a good thing, because it ties the two



central events in the life of the church more closely together – and of course, neither makes sense without the other, because if Jesus had just taken on flesh to show us how to live, He would not have dealt with our central need of forgiveness and a restored relationship with our loving heavenly Father that happened through the cross and resurrection; but if He hadn't taken on flesh and lived among us, then he would not have been qualified to be the one who, as we are told in Isaiah 53, '*took up our pain and bore our suffering*', and who was '*pierced for our transgressions*' and '*crushed for our iniquities*'.

And yet for many in our society, while they can 'get in the Christmas spirit', and attend nativity and carol services, a similar sentiment doesn't really exist with regard to Easter – yes, the Easter bunny and Easter eggs are part of our cultural landscape, but whereas crib and baby are still for many central to Christmas, the same cannot be said for cross and tomb.

And I think that the reasons for this contrast are not difficult to work out – for example, it is through the events of Good Friday that we are confronted with, on the one hand the cost and reality of sin, including our own - for, '*The Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all*', as Isaiah goes on to say; while on the other, on Easter Sunday we are confronted with the miracle of resurrection, which if it really happened, makes it much more difficult to deny that we have a God of love and power who is stronger than anyone or anything else in the Universe and who truly merits our love, our worship and our obedience. Or, to put all this another way, if we choose to do so, we can domesticate the crib but we cannot domesticate the cross. Therefore, our culture turns to the Easter bunny instead.

So how do we address this cultural unwillingness to engage with the true meaning of Easter? To begin with, we need to note that 21st Century Britain is hardly unique in distancing itself from the cross – even in the earliest days of the church, Paul was writing to the Corinthians, *‘We preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles’*. So part of our response will be to accept the reality that the cross will never be universally popular, for it demands that people recognise their faults and their need of help. But this does not mean to say we lose our confidence in the power of the crucified and risen Christ to transform hearts and minds, and maybe, therefore, we need to think more about how best people will hear this good news – for the cross and resurrection are like a multi-faceted gemstone that can be encountered from a huge variety of perspectives over time – and in our cultural context at the moment, two such perspectives come to mind:

1. Our emphasizing the open arms of Jesus on the cross, arms open in welcome and acceptance. We live in a very critical, often judgmental society, and that universal welcome (rather than our over-emphasizing sin and failure to live as God wants us to) being extended by Jesus at the cross is indeed good news.
2. Our focusing on the relational impact of the cross and resurrection – we know that Jesus went to the cross alone, because only He was ‘good enough to pay the price of sin’ but we also know that on the day of his resurrection, He came alongside those two disciples on the road to Emmaus and walked with them, helping them make sense of things as they journeyed along. And to me, this image of the risen, welcoming Christ coming alongside people in love and friendship, maybe even through you and me, seems to be a facet of the gem of Easter that we need to polish and hone.

Therefore, as we travel through Lent to Easter, this is a great time to do some polishing and honing, praying about who we need to welcome, who we need to accept, who we need to walk alongside, and then being attentive to who God brings to mind or brings across our paths.

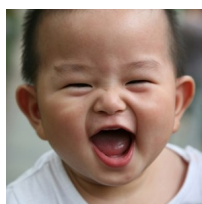

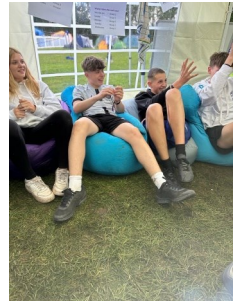

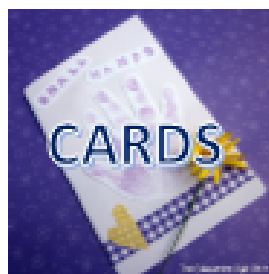

GREEN TEAM CRAFTERNOON



On Sunday 4th February, the Green Team held a craft afternoon in the church hall. About 25 people attended and had fun making beeswax

wraps and learning how to mend clothes using the Sashiko method.

Beeswax wraps are a natural, plastic free, alternative to clingfilm and can be used to wrap sandwiches and other food and last a long time with a little care. Beeswax pellets are sprinkled onto fabric placed between two sheets of greaseproof paper, then a hot iron is applied to melt the wax.



The Sashiko method is a style of Japanese embroidery and folk craft that is centuries old. Layers of fabric are stitched together to mend holes in clothing and can be the basis for some beautiful designs.

Huge thanks go to Deb and Daffyd Pritchard for leading the beeswax wrap making, and to Claire Golightly for the Sashiko mending.

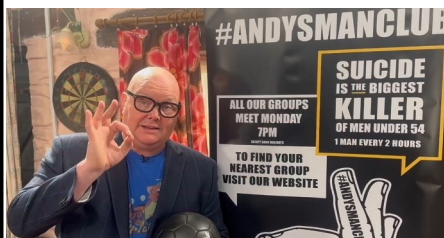
HELPING OUR HOSPICE

RIPON RENEWED UPDATE

Last year I hosted a Coffee Morning to raise funds towards the much-needed facilities at Ripon Cathedral that would serve the cathedral and wider community and visitors.

I knew that the building wasn't going to happen quickly but no-one expected what was going to take place over the last year that would cause significant delays, a tree with veteran status being one, if not the main, problem. Another problem was a change of site from the side of the Cathedral to the current proposed site of the Gardens across the road.
