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RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends

You may remember that in the August issue of Focus I wrote to you about our plans to encourage people to adopt a **Rhythm of Life (RoL)** in order to help us on our journey through life, and you might



even remember that we were suggesting that there could be four broad areas that we would look to help us think about a life-giving and sustainable rhythm, namely,

- Transforming, which is about together seeking to become more like Jesus in all we do;
- **Treasuring**, which is all about wanting/learning to receive and share the great spiritual treasures God longs to lavish on us;
- Travelling, where we recognise the importance of being on a shared, mutually supportive journey;
- Rhythming, which is about learning to live lives that are life-giving and life-enhancing lives based on those 'unforced rhythms of grace' that Jesus speaks about in Matthew 11:29 (Message version) which will allow us to live freely and lightly.



And I said that more information would be forthcoming in the Autumn – so here it is: to begin with, there will be two identical one hour meetings where I will speak more about/introduce our Rhythm of Life – the first is on **Sunday 1**st **October at 12 noon in St John's**, so it would be a case of staying around after the morning service at St John's or coming up from St Luke's; and the second will be at **7.30pm on**Wednesday **4**th **October**, also at **St John's**.

In addition, if you are part of one of our small groups (groups of up to 10 people) that meet on a fortnightly basis in people's homes, then the material this term will be focused on the RoL and the four areas mentioned above. If you are not part of one of these groups but would like to find out

more, then why not contact me – <u>simon.dowson@leeds.anglican.org</u> or 07786 282214.

Finally, also starting in October, there will be a sermon series about the Rhythm of Life – all of which means that I hope you will be well informed about how to join in – and the idea is that armed with all this information, people can make an informed choice for when we formally launch the RoL, most likely in the early New Year.

But **why** would you want to join in and start a RoL journey? Perhaps an illustration from my summer holiday will help. As part of our time away, Fiona and I went to Herefordshire and walked what is known as the Mortimer Trail, passing through the ancestral lands of the Mortimer family, starting at Ludlow Castle and ending up in the market town of Kington. It was a 30-mile trek, spread over two days, with an overnight stay at the halfway point at a lovely riverside inn with amazing vegetarian food.

For the most part, the trail was well signposted, and the first thing to say

was that we really enjoyed ourselves — the scenery was beautiful and varied, it was very quiet, and it was great to spend some uninterrupted time with each other. So, the journey was a good one. But it would have been much more difficult if we hadn't had the Ordnance Survey map on our phones, helping us find our way and get back on track



when we lost our bearing, which we did on a few occasions. I hope that the RoL will act in a similar way, giving us freedom to move forward with God, but also help keep us heading in the right direction, thus enabling us to go deeper and further on our journey of faith.

Likewise, as the saying goes, two heads are better than one, and the journey was both easier and more enjoyable because we had each other's company – and our RoL journey is a shared journey – shared with those others from church who are embracing the RoL, and shared with the one particular person we will be calling our 'fellow traveller' or 'soul mate', who will help us see if we are making good progress and also help us see where we might need to go next.

Then there is one other lesson from our trek which I think is applicable –

sometimes the trail was hard either because it was overgrown with nettles or because there were steep uphill sections – but overall, it was a great experience – and likewise having a RoL helps us see that while our progress as pilgrims can sometimes feel slow or unrewarding, the journey with God is the best journey to walk, as we learn from Jesus 'the unforced rhythms of grace.' I do hope and even expect, therefore, that our RoL will be a blessing to us all. So please, take the trouble to find out more.

LIMITLESS

This summer we took nineteen young people to Limitless, a Christian festival for young people. The festival is all about living in community, connection to God and being transformed through a relationship with Jesus. The days were book-ended with a morning and evening worship, teaching and prayer session all together with 5000 other teenagers! Then during the day, the young people either went to seminars, played sports, took part in activities such as a zip wire or a colour run, or hung around and ate chips or crepes!



Our prayer before we went to Limitless was that no one left the camp without being changed in some way. And that certainly happened! God was so kind and really showed us some of the work he was doing in the young people: As the week went on, they became more and more open to the sung worship and started to join in singing and dancing! And on the last night, four of them stood up and made a commitment to follow Jesus, which was just amazing to witness. God was also at work in our leaders too, and I think our prayer that no one returned unchanged was answered overwhelmingly. Thank you Lord Jesus.

The four trees, round the church, loaned by Horticap, represent the four seasons of the Church's year:

- Celebration (gold) of the beauty of the world God made.
 We cut out gold leaves to hang on the tree
- Mourning (purple) We hung purple squares on the tree as we thought of the disasters caused by our abuse of the world: floods, wildfires, climate change
- Action (green/everyday) We were invited to write on a strip of green paper one action we'll try to make ourselves eg reusing/ recycling more, reducing car journeys
- ReAddress (red) We can write to our MP about some of the political issues for example the release of sewage into rivers. We tied a piece of red wool to the tree.



The bark path symbolises a tree, with the roots outside coming in to church and culminating at the front of the church. It represents bringing the outside in and the inside out.

Thinking, praying, discussion, can we make a difference? Can we re/a/dress?

The coffee morning on 14th October is being held in aid of Horticap. Located at Bluecoat Wood Nurseries on Otley Road (past RHS Harlow Carr, on the way to Beckwithshaw), Horticap is an independent, registered charity which provides adults with learning or other disabilities with training in horticulture, rural skills and crafts. Founded in 1984, Horticap supports students to develop their social and communication skills and trains them using professionally qualified staff and volunteers.

On site there is an excellent garden centre with a wide range of plants, and Hopkins café and shop. There is also a garden which members of the public can enjoy, including a wildlife and bird spotting area and picnic areas. Horticap will be bringing a range of their plants, bird seed and bird boxes to the coffee morning, so please do come along and support this excellent local cause.



Thank you to all those who supported us by making generous donations and by attending or helping at last Saturday's coffee morning. In total £494 was raised, all of which will go to help the children of poor tea plantation workers in Sri Lanka to gain a university education.

Dignity through Education started in 2015 by supporting three students, and currently we are supporting 33 thanks to the ongoing support and generosity of donors. The students whom we support are very appreciative.

Of the original three students one qualified in law and is currently working as a solicitor in the tea plantation areas. Another graduated in communications and IT and is working in a government department holding a responsible position within the tea plantations. One student was unable to finish his studies.

With additional donors we could support more than the present 32.. To support an individual student, donors commit to paying £144 per year for the 3 or 4 year course. Donations can be made either by paying £144 annually; or by paying £12.00 monthly by bank direct debit; or by a single one-off donation. Donors are put in touch with the individual they support.

QUESTION CORNER

Q. Once a baby is baptised, does God love him or her more than before?

A. No. In the Middle Ages priests taught that babies had to be baptised to save their souls from hell, and that all flesh was evil. So it had to be by TOTAL immersion, and 'holy water' was kept in large



fonts with lids which were locked (to keep the devil out). What a terrible view of God behind all that!

Let's turn these ideas upside down.
Baptism is not a lucky charm, and
babies are not baptised to make God
accept them and love them more.
Parents should bring baby for baptism
precisely because they know that God

loves that child ALREADY. He or she is brought into the church family to learn, with others, what that means, especially through the teachings of Jesus. Hopefully this will lead to a personal commitment to Christ, made public in Confirmation — confirming the promises made by parents and godparents.



In the 1960s, in Manchester, lots of non-

church parents asked for baptism. It seemed to be regarded as a spiritual inoculation (against what?) Many said 'I want him 'done' so he'll get on all right! Somehow that word made me think of things cooking in the oven—'Are they done yet?' So I was tempted to ask 'how do you want him done—fried, boiled or roasted? But no, I never said it!

Now, as then, parents not choosing baptism can have a service of blessing and thanksgiving for their baby. And they should be assured that God loves their child just as much as those who are baptised.

St. John's Church welcomed visitors to two guided walks, hosted by Bilton Historical Society, as part of September's national 'Heritage Open Days' festival of history and culture. The walks, which each lasted nearly 2 hours, toured the graveyard and entered the church for a close-up view of the stained-glass windows dedicated to members of the Sheepshanks and Nicholson families.

The tours visited some of the interesting graves to hear about their background stories. For example:

- husband and wife Joseph Johnson (c1826-1902) and Mary Jane Johnson nee
 Fryer (c1835-1893) first met while they were both
 in service in the 1860s as gardener and cook at
 Parsonage House on Park Parade to the first vicar
 Thomas Sheepshanks.
- two organists are buried here: Thomas Admiral March (c1829-1896) was St John's organist for 35 years and most probably its first organist, and Dr Edwin Crow (1841-1907), a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists, was Ripon Cathedral's organist and choirmaster 1873-1907.
- John Dixon (1829-1896) is buried in the churchyard and also has a dedicated window in

the south wall of the church,. He was part of the antiquarian community in $% \left\{ 1,2,\ldots ,n\right\}$



Leeds, contributed articles to the journal 'Reliquiae Antiquae Eboracenses' and, although not the greatest of poets, was a talented amateur artist. He held the important post of Secretary and Collector at Leeds General Infirmary for nearly 40 years, which explains the scenes and inscriptions in his window depicting Jesus surrounded by the sick and disabled from His healing miracles. John's funeral service

was conducted by the Rev Thomas Sheepshanks over thirty years after he had left Bilton to become vicar at St Peter's Church, Arthington.
